PTSD Presumption in the Workers' Compensation Law

Although recovery for a purely mental occupational injury of PTSD has been compensable for the past several years, recent legislation has created a presumption of occupational relatedness for first responders. This session gives an overview of the law and what it may mean for sheriffs' offices.

Lessons Learned from Large-scale Events

From public protests to employees' use of social media, First Amendment considerations are as prevalent in law enforcement as the Fourth Amendment. Freedom of speech, freedom of the press and the freedom to associate are cornerstones of individual civil rights. However, as with any rights, the scope of those are not absolute. This session provides an overview of the legal contours of those rights, common scenarios that arise around them and strategies for addressing conflicting rights and duties.
