Sample Phishing Attack Answer Key

Seven warning signs point to this message being a phishing scam.

1. Sender name and e-mail address do not match, nor does the domain name From: Bank of America Smallbusiness [mailto:dorholdptyltd@telkomsa.net] Sent: Thursday, December 13, 2018 12:47 PM To: Name < name@co.spruce.mn.us > Subject: ACH Batch **2.** Generic subject line Dear . 3. Not sent to a specific person 4.
